News for the Superintendent by Lorrie Miller

During our non-student-contact day on February 19, staff members met for a day-long collaborative discussion on four major school components. The four components were 1) School Improvement Action Plans, 2) Technology Needs and a Plan for Purchases, 3) Our Wellness Policy, and 4) Safety and Security Procedures.

School Improvement Goals include increased reading and math skills, and better collaboration between campuses. Teachers talked about what it will take to increase students' skills. It is common for teachers to receive training on new curriculum and better teaching strategies every year. Trainings are expensive but very necessary. We now have a documented plan to conduct such trainings with experts coming to our campus for the next five years. The trainings will have to take place during non-student-contact days, usually the week before school starts. Most school districts have non-student-contact days during the school year, at least once per month. Our annual calendar currently does not include this many training days, and I suggest that in the future, the teacher contracts, the Negotiated Agreement, and the annual calendar change to lengthen the school year in order to give teachers a chance to get the training they need during the school year.

Along with teacher training, technology is a big need in our school district. We now have a three-year technology plan to provide students and staff with what they need without having to pay for it all at once. This plan will be updated on an on-going basis as the years go by and current technology becomes obsolete.

Our Wellness Policy seems very strict with limits on sugar and soft drinks. We recently took a survey to create a baseline of our compliance with the policy. We will take the survey each year, and we will see if the surveys reflect better compliance with time.

With regards to security, we have a very detailed All Hazards Safety Plan. Staff members practiced an evacuation to two off-campus safe sites. We will conduct the evacuations with students sometime this month. In the case of a real emergency, please do not call the school or drive to the school. We will need to keep telephone lines open and streets clear of traffic so that emergency services can get through to us.

I have asked the Community Shepherds to start a blanket campaign. In planning our emergency evacuation drill to an off-campus safe site, I gathered materials to put in a medical bag. There is no room for blankets, and our off-campus safe sites do not currently house blankets. I believe that if we have to walk to the off-campus safe sites in cold weather, or if a child is anxious, a blanket would comfort him/her. If you have a blanket to give, please launder it including time in a dryer with heat. If you can make a monetary donation to purchase new blankets, please give it to the Community Shepherds. If there was a humanitarian award this month, it would go to sophomore basketball player Jeremy Carley. He was recognized by a fan of the Creek Valley team after our game with them. The fan, Ernie H., explained in an email message to our Athletic Director Lance Howitt, "I want to praise one young man No. 21 Jeremy Carley for an act of supreme sportsmanship. We have a challenged young man on our team and once in a while when opportunity presents itself, he gets to play. The game was out of hand in our favor and Brandon was allowed to play. He had an opportunity to shoot and did. He missed. Jeremy got the rebound and turned and threw the ball directly to Brandon to give him another chance. And another chance. And another chance which he made. He did this twice. After the first time, I was on my feet cheering Jeremy's unselfish act. Please let him know that it did not go unnoticed. The world needs more Jeremys. Thank you."

Our Policy Manual is now updated and being placed on our website. If you are wondering about a policy, instead of contacting the office, you can simply look it up yourself online. Just go to www.leytonwarriors.org and click on the "District" tab. "District Policy" will be listed, and when you click on it, you will see a list of the sections 1000-6000. Choose the section that matches your subject, and you will see a list of the policies. Of course, you can still contact the office, and we will help you locate the information you need. I want to publically thank Mrs. Janella Kruse, Office Manager, who has typed all these policies and ascertained their accuracy.

I will soon be meeting with a representative from Western Nebraska Community College (WNCC) to discuss Dual Enrollment courses. These are classes taught on our campus by our teachers, for which the students receive high school credit from Leyton High School as well as college credit from WNCC. Right now, the possible courses are in Ag, Business, Technology, English, Basic Nurse Assistant, and Medical Terminology. The student is responsible for paying the tuition directly to the college, but it is at a discounted rate. With several dual credit courses, it is possible for a student to graduate from high school and enter college as a sophomore.

Pre-registration for 2018-2019 classes begins this month for high school students. Guidance Counselor Ms. Laura Neubauer will meet with students to discuss the new graduation requirements and to distribute the Course Description Book which was recently approved by the School Board. Students should bring a copy of the Course Description Book home so that parents can hold conversations with their child(ren) about the best courses for them. Elementary and junior high curricula are also described in the Course Description Book. Any elementary or junior high parent wishing to receive a copy of this book can contact the school secretary.

Kindergarten Round-Up is on our schedule for April. Before a Kindergartener can enroll in a public school, they must meet some medial requirements. A physical examination and a vision examination by licensed medical health providers must be documented on a school form. This year, we are adding a required dental exam. Documentation of certain vaccinations is also a state requirement. Our school nurse can provide parents answers to questions about state mandated requirements of enrollment on the day of Kindergarten Round-Up.

CALL TO ORDER:

Moved by Mr. Benish, seconded by Mr. Linton to approve the agenda. Motion approved 6-0.

Mr. Russ Rushman addressed the Board regarding student suspensions and patron parking for activities.

BUSINESS MEETING:

Moved by Mr. Benish, seconded by Mrs. Cruise to approve the minutes of the Board's regular meeting for January 8, 2018. Motion approved 6-0.

Moved by Mr. Benish, seconded by Mr. Linton to approve the minutes of the Board's special meeting for January 31, 2018. Motion approved 6-0.

Moved by Mr. Linton, seconded by Mrs. Powell to approve General Fund bills and financial reports as presented. Motion approved 6-0.

Moved by Mr. Benish, seconded by Mr. Rushman to approve bills and financial reports from the remaining funds as presented. Motion approved 6-0.

ACTION ITEMS:

Mr. Chris Morgan addressed the Board with the Task Force's recommendations for graduation requirements beginning with the class of 2019. Moved by Mr. Benish, seconded by Mr. Rushman to approve those graduation requirements as presented. Motion approved 6-0.

Tabled approval of the 2018-2019 school calendar pending activities' schedules and teacher concerns. Moved by Mr. Benish, seconded by Mr. Linton to approve APL training for certified staff for the 2018-2019 school year. Motion approved 6-0.

Moved by Mr. Benish, seconded by Mr. Henke to approve a Superintendent's contract for Mr. Chris Geary for the 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 school years. Motion approved 6-0.

Moved by Mr. Benish, seconded by Mrs. Powell to approve the course description book as presented. Motion approved 6-0.

Moved by Mr. Benish, seconded by Mr. Henke to approve the school attorney's policy recommendations with noted changes as discussed: to revise #6003 (Instructional Program), #6004 (Curriculum Development), #6005 (Academic Credits and Graduation), #6006 (Commencement Ceremony), #6007 (Senior Recognition), #6008 (Class Rank), #6009 (Grade Place & Academic Credit of Transfer Students), #6010 (Special Education), #6012 (Flag Display and Patriotic Observances), #6014 (School Attendance on Days of Scheduled Activities), #6016 (Homebound and Off-Campus Instruction), #6018 (Grades), #6025 (Student Cell Phone and Other Electronic Devices), #6026 (Emergency Dismissal), #6028 (Extracurricular Activities

Program), #6029 (Activity Trips), #6030 (Public Appearances of School Groups), #6031 (Emergency Exclusion) and #6034 (Concussion Awareness); to delete #6019 (Communication with Parents) and #6024 (Student Discipline); to adopt #6032 (Constitution Day Education) and #6033 (Restraint and Seclusion of Students). DISCUSION ITEMS (WITH POSSIBLE ACTION):

The Board discussed some of the ideas from their Retreat such as considering writing grants to accommodate a preschool in our District. They also discussed school spirit and ways to unify the community in that effort. The Transportation and Building & Grounds committees will present further ideas under reports.

Moved by Mr. Benish, seconded by Mr. Rushman to reduce staff by 25% in the Special Education department beginning with the 2018-2019 school year. Motion approved 6-0.

Moved by Mr. Linton, seconded by Mrs. Powell to add a .5 FTE elementary principal. Motion approved 6-0.

REPORTS:

The Transportation Committee reported that they were considering a new activity bus with a possible trade in of other buses. Moved by Mr. Rushman, seconded by Mr. Linton to purchase a 2007 MCI coach style bus and give the transportation committee discretion on trading, selling, or updating the current activity buses. Motion approved 6-0.

The Building and Grounds Committee reported on potential summer projects. At the Dalton site, they plan to continue with new windows and carpet in the classrooms, complete sidewalk/concrete work, and improve the science lab. In Gurley, a drop ceiling in the hallway and new lighting will be installed. Also, the Foundation is planning enhancements to the locker rooms. Moved by Mr. Linton, seconded by Mrs. Cruise to give authority to the building and grounds committee to get the windows project started now. Motion approved 6-0.

Mr. Howitt reported on upcoming events/activities: Teacher In-Service (Feb. 19), MAC Speech at Potter-Dix (Feb. 21), Science Fair (Feb. 21), MAC Band Clinic at Garden Co. (Feb. 26), 5th grade Wax Museum (Feb. 28), Speech & Sweets (March 5), Spring Break (March 7-9), JH Dance (March 16), STUCO Winter Fun Night (March 24). He also recapped the winter activities stating that the HS girls' basketball sub-districts starts Feb. 13th and the boys' sub-districts will start Feb. 20th. The Cheerleaders will attend State Cheer competition on Feb. 16th & 17th. The JH basketball seasons have concluded and they were both very successful. Mr. Howitt will contact Bridgeport High School regarding a possible wrestling co-op with them next year.

Ms. Miller reported on the Mentor Program to be created.

The next regular meeting of the Leyton Board of Education will be Monday, March 12, 2018 at 6:30 p.m. The meeting will be held in the district's administrative offices at Leyton High School in Dalton.

An Open Message to Parents and Patrons of the Leyton Public School Community:

Leyton Public School District has developed an All-Hazards Safety Plan that is designed to minimize danger to anyone occupying the school, should an emergency occur. Our main objective is to attend to the health and welfare of your children in the event of a crisis.

In most emergencies, your children will remain and be cared for within the walls of the building they attend. In the rare event of an emergency affecting the building your child attends, such as a gas leak, a broken water main, a fire, or a toxic spill, the students will either walk or be transported to an off-campus safe site. The safe site for Gurley is the Gurley Community Hall. The safe site for Dalton is the American Legion Hall. If we have to relocate to these sites, you will be notified.

We ask that you adhere to the following procedure if you hear of any school emergency:

- 1) Be watchful of messages via EZMessaging, our website, and Sidney radio stations. We will do our best to keep the public informed.
- 2) Do not telephone the school. We have limited telephone lines and we need them to be free in order to contact law enforcement, medical providers, and our other school campus.
- 3) Do not come to the school or the off-campus safe site unless you are asked to come pick up your child(ren). Any emergency involving the school means that emergency vehicles and emergency workers must be able to get to the building. We can't have streets blocked.

Thank you for helping us care for your children.

What's Happening In Science Classes? By Jesse Henderson, High School Science Teacher

Greetings from the Science Room at Leyton High School! This month is very exciting for our students as we plan new investigations and step outside of our comfort zone to learn about our exciting universe.

Our tenth grade Biology students are in the process of planning and carrying out a number of different experiments intended to identify some of the many bacteria and microscopic organisms found naturally in our school. The students have chosen to examine different areas of the school, such as the locker rooms, common hallways, and the music room, to see the different strains of bacteria that surround us on a daily basis. This experience is designed to give our students an introduction to real world laboratory procedures and skills that are currently being used in hospitals and labs all over the country. More importantly, students are learning to think outside the box, solve problems, analyze and communicate data.

If you were fortunate enough to be able to visit the annual Science Fair in Gurley last week, you had a chance to see our Physics students present the progress on their semester project. The project is intended to give the students experience in design and engineering. The task is to launch a rocket carrying a raw egg to a height of at least 400 feet and return the egg safely to the ground. They are required to design and engineer a cargo system that will protect the egg from the forces involved during launch, landing, and anything in between. In addition, these students are using CAD software to design mission-critical components to their rocket that are being produced using the school's 3-D printer. To make the adventure more exciting, the students have decided to invite all interested students and teachers in the junior high and high school to share in the experience. Students and teachers are encouraged to design and build a rocket of their own and bring it to the launch on April XX. Our Physics students are looking forward to the challenge.

In a new opportunity this year, our Environmental Science class has been working hard to study the differences between the many different ecosystems that make up our beautiful world. We are looking into ways different species, including humans, interact and impact the environment both locally and around the globe. We have been researching actions we can take to bring more sustainability to rural and urban areas alike. Currently, we are planning an outing that will investigate and catalogue the many different ecosystems found in the Nebraska Panhandle and our neighboring states. We will travel from Dalton to the Continental Divide, making several stops along the way to observe the transitions between the natural environments, how some communities are working to make the interfaces between urban and natural areas sustainable, and ways in which those communities have also worked to institute environmentally friendly solutions to city life.

These are only some of the exciting activities our students are working on in the Leyton High School Science room. If you have questions, feel free to speak with any of the high school students. I'm certain they will be happy to talk about the different projects going on in any of the classes.

2018 Rules and Regulations

Team Rosters

- 1. Players must play with players that were in high school while you were also in high school. All players must be from Leyton High School, except for one outside player if needed.
- 2. All teams should wear similar jerseys/shirts during the tournament. Basketball shoes or clean tennis shoes must be worn for all games.
- 3. All team coaches are entirely responsible to make sure that their players fully understand and follow tournament rules and regulations.
- 4. All participants must have signed the waiver/liability form on the official roster sheet prior to the first game played. This will be available the day of the event.

Entry Fee

- 1. The entry fee is \$120 per team. Checks should be made out to the Leyton Public School Foundation, and Mailed to Jeremy Reimers Rd 101 Dalton, NE 69131
- 2. Early registration deadline will be March 1st with the fee of \$20. The other \$100 can be paid the day of the event.Registration after March 1st will cost \$140 total per team. This is for Bracketing purposes.
- 3. Please fill out entry form attached below and forward that along with the check for early registration.

Playing Rules

- 1. Game Clock: Games consist of two 20 minute halves. The clock will run, except for the last 2 minutes of both halves. If a team is ahead by more than 20 points at anytime during the last 2 minutes, the clock will run.
- 2. Overtime: All overtimes will consist of three minute periods with clock stopping with fouls and violations in the last one minute.
- 3. Time Outs: Each team will be given 2 time outs (1 minute) per half and they will not carry over. In case of overtime, 1 extra time out will be given.
- 4. Team Fouls: Players will be given 5 fouls per game. Bonus shots will be given after the 7th team foul and the team will be in double bonus after the 10th team foul, per half.

- 5. Technical Fouls: All technical fouls will account for a personal foul. A player who receives a technical foul must sit out of the game for three minutes off the game clock before he/she will be allowed back into the game. If a player receives a second technical foul during the same game the player will be ejected from the tournament.
- 6. 3-Pointers: High School 3-point line will be utilized in all games.
- 7. Pressing: Full Court pressing is allowed.

Conduct

- 1. All participants; coaches and spectators shall refrain from using profanity or verbal abuse towards other players, coaches, spectators, referees, and tournament staff.
- 2. Team coaches will be responsible for the conduct of their players. Teams and spectators shall abide by tournament rules and regulations.
- 3. The Tournament Director and Staff are not responsible for any personal items left behind, lost, or stolen.

Fighting

1. Fighting is an attempt to strike an opponent with arms, hands, legs, feet, or combative action by one or more players, a coach, or other team personnel. Any member or team personnel who participate in a fight shall be immediately suspended from the game for the duration of the game and possible for future games to be determined by tournament director.


